

## First Aid Kit

## **Instructions**

You should prepare a first-aid kit for your travels. Carry it with you wherever you go. Many of the following items are available overseas, though it may be preferable to buy them before leaving Canada. Note that oral rehydration salts/oral rehydration therapy (ORS/ORT) are quite expensive in Canada, and much cheaper in the countries where they are likely to be needed It is suggested to buy a minimal amount before departure and purchase some in the host country. Note that some items i.e. scissors, Swiss Army Knife, suggested in this kit should be packed in your checked luggage while in transport (especially flying) due to security regulations. Please note that other items (like syringes/needles and pharmaceuticals like Tylenol 3 may require physician notes) Pack the items in a sturdy, accessible container (preferably waterproof/resistant) such as hip pouch, Tupperware box.
